Worshipful Deck 2015/16

The 350th Anniversary of the Great Fire of London in 1666

Theme

The theme for this year's double deck is in recognition of the 350th Anniversary of the Great Fire in London in 1666.

The fire was said to have started in a baker's oven in Pudding Lane, the premises of Thomas Farynor baker to the King. The fire quickly spread and in the course of four days and destroyed 436 acres or some 80% of the City of London and 25% of the capitol as a whole. The recorded number of structures destroyed was 13,200 houses, 87 churches and many famous buildings including the Royal Exchange and St Pauls Cathedral. Remarkably only 6 deaths were officially recorded.



The Master

Richard Wells was admitted to the Livery of the makers of Playing Cards in 2007 and joined the court of Assistants in 2012. He became a Freeman of the city of London and a Liveryman of the Worshipful Company of Gardeners in 1985. Richard spent some 56 years working in the City of London, mainly in Lloyd's and the London Insurance market, holding numerous directorships and executive appointments.



About the Cards

The Kings – Represent the principal dramatic personage connected with the Great Fire. King Charles 2nd, his younger brother James (later King James 2nd), who basically took charge of the efforts to put the fire out. Samuel Pepys, Secretary of the Navy and diarist, famous for giving a first-hand account of the disaster and Sir Christopher Wren, Architect responsible for the re-building of much of the city.



The Queens – depict four of Wren's masterpieces: the re-built St. Pauls Cathedral, the Church of St Lawrence Jewry next to the Guildhall, the Old Royal Naval College at Greenwich and The Monument.

The Knaves – show images or scenes connected with the Great Fire and its aftermath: a medieval baker's oven, a fire insurance sign, rudimentary fire services and Pudding Lane road sign.



The Jokers – show Nell Gwyn, mistress of King Charles 2nd and The Golden Boy of Pye, a statue erected in Giltspur Street, Smithfield, where the fire was eventually stopped. Beneath the statue is an inscription, with the words: "This Boy is in Memmory Put up for the late Fire of London Occasion'd by the Sin of Gluttony" .



Card Backs – are unusual in that they show the left-hand and right-hand halves of the 1666 Shlohavot woodcut print, the only surviving contemporary record of the fire.

The Shlohavot print on the back is reproduced by permission of the Museum of London and the paintings displayed on the four Kings reproduced by permission of the national Portrait Gallery.

A version of the Wenceslaus Hollar print depicting the extent of the Great Fire has been reproduced on the sleeve by permission of The British Museum.

This year the design has again been undertaken by Brad Zachary Baker of Amesbury.

Card History

'Peter Stuyvesant'



Born in Holland in 1602. In 1647 came to America as Governor of new Amsterdam.

After years of conflict between Dutch and English settlers, Charles the 2nd gave his brother the Duke of York the colony and Stuyvesant was obliged to surrender to the English fleet. New Amsterdam then became New York.

Stuyvesant spent his last days on a farm near new York and died at 80.

Contrary to popular belief, Stuyvesant did not lose his leg in his country's defense but in fighting with Barbary pirates.

Of his elaborately designed wooden legs, one studded with silver earned him the name " Old Silvernails"

'The Croton'

A light wood burning passenger locomotive built for the Hudson River R.R. in 1851.

This elegant model reflects the style of the period. The engine once pulled a 90 ton, seven car train at an average speed of 40 mph including stops.

'Gordon Grant'

A master of painted sailing vessels is Gordon Grant and many a gallant old windjammer has made her last voyage on his painted seas.

Converted into fishing boats their former white splendour covered with brown paint, Gordon Grant says "Though they suffer the full degree of their humiliation and no lover of ships doubts that they do, they are now an inspiring sight as they go bowling out through the Golden gate a potent reminder of the glory that was".

Born in San Francisco June 7th 1875, Gordon Grant began his career with Harpers Weekly, took part in the Boer war and later painted a picture of the Constitution to help save "Old Ironside".

He was attached to the General Staff, USA at Washington DC during the World War.

Ships of the sea and men of the sea and seashore, beaches washed by hurling spray, sunlit dunes, evidences of the eternal conflict between land and sea – are subjects expertly managed by the brush of Gordon Grant.
